Book28 Library Workshop


A talk and interactive workshop from the Book28 Library on LGBTQ+ literature and libraries. Book28 is a small LGBTQ+ library held at the Outside Project (a LGBTQ+ homeless shelter in Clerkenwell). It's named in part after the Section 28 punitive law of

the 1980s and aims to look at the way it has had lasting impact on library services for LGBTQ+ people today. A key part of the project is encouraging good LGBTQ+ collections in libraries everywhere.

The group will talk about how the project came about, how the pandemic has affected their work and will lead discussions with event attendees about their own routes into LGBTQ+ literature and the books we enjoy. Pride & Prejudice in Poland


The situation of LGBTQ+ people in Poland – never very good – has been deteriorating fast under the current right-wing, populist government. There are attacks on non-heteronormative people, constant attempts at curbing their rights. There are protests, marches and people are being arrested. Recently the fight for the rights of LGBTQ+ people has also

become part of a wider wave of demonstrations under the umbrella of the Women's *Black Protests*, which has shaken Poland since the attempt at making the abortion law even more restrictive. At the same time more and more local authorities across Poland are choosing to proclaim themselves as "LGBT-free" zones. How does this whole upheaval impact literature and writers? What is writers' involvement and response, if any?

With Jacek Dehnel, acclaimed poet and novelist from Poland, now based in Berlin, as well as

UK-based poets and translators Maria Jastrzębska and Anna Blasiak. Chaired by Dr Roch

Dunin-Wąsowicz from the UCL and LSE.

Mark of Lilith (1986, 32 mins, Dirs Polly Gladwin, Zachary Mack-Nataf, Bruna Fionda), an independant horror film in which black lesbian filmmaker Zena, interested in the depiction of women in art, meets Lilla, a white, undead wraith, through a film come true. Playing off the lesbian vampire film motif of the 1970s, the film deconstructs the traditional image of the vampire and the horror genre itself by exploring the politics of race and relationships. With scenes filmed at Brixton's Ritzy Cinema in the 1980s, the film is an important part of its black queer

history, fictionalising LGBTQ life in Lambeth during this time. 

Join the Radical Readers reading group to discuss Berlin's *Third Sex* by Magnus Hirschfeld. Rough trade, drag kings, tea dances, sporty dykes, coded classified ads, campy nicknames, passing, outing, hustlers, beats and cruising at the YMCA – all accompanied by a wave of gay and lesbian activism. This was Germany's imperial capital at the dawn of the 20th century. Magnus Hirschfeld's Berlin's *Third Sex* reveals an astonishingly diverse gay subculture years ahead of the Weimar era, with cross-dressing

cabaret, all-night parties and erotic license at every level of society. Hirschfeld's writing is a foundational text of modern gay identity, queer history captured by an insider: as it happened.

Ready, Steady, Census!

The decennial census is almost upon us. Households across Lambeth will soon be asked to take part in the nationwide survey of housing and the population. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

Information from the digital-first census will help decide how

services are planned and funded in your local area. This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, housing or new bus routes. Census day is March 21.

This census there will be three new questions, one on previous service in the UK Armed Forces, and voluntary questions on sexuality and gender identity. These have been included in order to build a better picture of society, to combat inequality, and to show where services are needed. If you do not feel comfortable answering on the same form as the rest of your household, you can request an individual census questionnaire and answer separately.
